

ELECTIONS

For even years since the inception of Panchayati Raj (PR) in 1959 till 1970, elections had been conducted in the state only thrice in 1959, 1964 and 1970. The 1959 elections had been held for all the Panchayat samitis and Zilla Parishads (ZPs). Several members of the state legislature had been elected as chairpersons of the ZPs and Panchayat Samitis, in many cases unanimously. In the elections of 1964, all the rural voters had participated, as the entire state was by then covered by the Panchayat samitis. Unanimous elections had been encouraged for the sake of maintaining a harmonious atmosphere in the villages. In 7,177 gram Panchayats, members had been elected unanimously and in 13,287 gram Panchayats the Sarpanches had been elected unanimously. The elections had been peaceful in all but twenty-two gram Panchayats. The elections held in 1970 recorded a few instances of violence.

The next elections to PR bodies in the state had been scheduled for 1979, but were deferred owing to a writ petition filed in the High Court challenging certain statutory provisions pertaining to the reservation of elective office for the scheduled castes. After the disposal of the writ petition, the elections had been slated for 1980, but were again postponed

in view of the impending reorganization of the taluks to make them coterminous with blocks. The part, the approaching decennial census (1981) and a writ petition filed in the High Court had also necessitated postponement of the elections which were finally held in 1981.

Elections were again held after the coming into effect of the 1986 Act. Elections were held in March 1987 to Panchayati Raj bodies at all levels except the gram Panchayat, since these had already been held in March 1986, and as stipulated, had not been on party lines. At the mandal and Zilla Praja Parishad levels the elections had been party-based with a ban imposed on split in the party. The Vice-President of the mandal had to be elected by members of the Mandal Praja Parishad from among themselves.

With the introduction of direct elections for the post of chairperson (ZPP) and President (MPP) and with the provision of ex-officio membership to these bodies, an internal conflict was built into the organization. There were cases where a majority of the members of the ZPP belonged to one party, for chairperson belonged to the opposition party (in this instance the Congress party). There were also instances where a majority of the members of the MPP belonged to the Congress party and the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) but the president belonged to the Telugu Desam Party (TDP).

In view of the problems encountered while implementing the 1986 reforms, the government constituted an expert committee headed by BPR Vithal, deputy Chairperson of the State Planning Board, to study and make recommendations on the structure, content and mode of elections to Panchayati Raj bodies in the state. The committee, which submitted its report in 1992, recommended:

- (a) The creation of five hundred to 550 taluks in place of the 1,104 mandals;
- (b) The creation of taluk Panchayat samitis for every eighty thousand to one lakh population;
- (c) The merging of two to three mandals into one taluk Panchayat samiti;

- (d) The handing over of all the development programmes implemented by various agencies to the taluk Panchayat samitis;
- (e) Introducing a system of negative voting, with members who polled more than 50 per cent of votes bring declared elected;
- (f) Elections to Panchayati Raj bodies on non-party basis and prohibition on use of political party symbols in elections;
- (g) Constitution of six standing committees at the Samiti level, one each for planning, economy, agriculture and rural development, education, social welfare, women's welfare, and works;
- (h) The appointment of a taluk development officer in the taluk Panchayat samiti to be assisted by extension officers;
- (i) Dropping of the word praja in the nomenclature 'Zilla Praja Parishad',
- (j) Indirect elections for the post of chairperson of the Zilla Parishad.

The Vithal Committee's recommendations were referred to a cabinet sub-committee which agreed to the replacement of the mandals by the taluk Panchayat samitis.

These changes resulted in the postponement of elections to Panchayati Raj bodies. The government, which had promised to conduct elections to these bodies in 1992, kept postponing them on one pretext or another.

Although there had been several attempts to improve the functioning of Panchayati Raj in the period prior to the 73rd Constitutional Amendment, they had failed because of their half-hearted nature. In spite of the recommendations of several committees there was no improvement in the financial status of Panchayati Raj bodies. Development programmes relating to the economy, the tribal people, the SCs and women had continued to be implemented by special agencies. This had undermined the importance of Panchayat Institutions. The bureaucracy

on the one hand and politicians on the other also shared a common fear of losing power if Panchayati Raj was to become a strong and vibrant institutional structure.

The Andhra Pradesh Panchayat Raj Act, 1994, became operative on 30th May 1994. The first state election commission was appointed on 5th June 1994. Elections were announced earlier for December 1994, but these were postponed due to assembly elections and a change of government.

Elections to Mandal Parishads and Zilla Parishads were held in two phases on 6th and 10th March 1995. About 70 per cent of the voters exercised their franchise. Out of the total 1,093 Zilla Parishad territorial constituencies, the Telugu Desam Party won 695 (64 per cent) and the Congress (I) won about 25 per cent. In the elections to Mandal Parishad territorial constituencies, the Telugu Desam Party was 52 per cent and the Congress (I) party 34 per cent of the total seats. Other parties which secured some seats were CPI (M), CPI, BJP, Janata Dal and MCPI. Independents also won a few seats. The members were elected unanimously in about 4.5 per cent of Zilla Parishad territorial constituencies and 6 per cent of Mandal territorial constituencies. The first phase of elections to the gram Panchayats were held on 24th and 27th June, 1995. About 70 to 75 per cent of the voters exercised their franchise to elect 9,477 gram Panchayats. Election to the remaining gram Panchayats were held on 30th June and July 1995. The majority of the gram Panchayats (about 578 per cent) was captured by the candidates supported by the Telugu Desam Party. The Congress (I) won the seats in about 30 per cent of the gram Panchayats. In these elections the voters, for the first time, found themselves exercising their franchise four times to elect a ward member of the gram Panchayat a member of the mandal Parishad and a member of the Zilla Parishad.

Elections to the PRIs in the state were due in March 2000 for the Mandal and Zilla Parishads and in July 2000 for the gram Panchayats. However the state government promulgates an ordinance to defer the MP and ZP elections and appointed special officers for their administration.

The state election commission and some other organizations filed write petitions in the Andhra Pradesh High Court challenging this decision of the government. Although the high court quashed the ordinance, the Supreme Court, responding to a write petition filed by the state government stayed the High Court's order¹.

The Five Year term of elected bodies of Mandal Praja Parishads and Zilla Praja Parishads expired on 21-07-2011 and 22-07-2011 respectively. The ordinary elections could not be conducted before expiry of term due to litigation in the Hon'ble High Court of Andhra Pradesh and the Supreme Court of India on the subject of reservation of seats and offices in Panchayat Raj Institutions (PRIs) as the aggregate percentage of reservations for SCs, STs and BCs exceeded 50 per cent stipulated by the Apex Court in its judgment in W.P (Civil) No. 356 of 1994 dated 11-05-2010 in Dr. K. Krishna Murthy Vs. Union of India.

The legal impediments for conducting elections to Panchayat Raj Institutions (PRIs) were cleared with the interim directions passed by the Hon'ble Supreme Court during the State Government and the state election commission to proceed with the elections with the existing system of reservations.²

The reservation particulars in respect of sarpanch and ward members of gram Panchayats in the state were furnished by the government to the state election commission on 1-7-2013. The Commission issued election notification on 03-07-2013 and completed 4th ordinary elections to gram Panchayats by the end of July 2013. However, the government chose to not to finalize and communicate reservation of seats and offices in MPPs and ZPPs till another direction was given by the Hon'ble Supreme Court in March, 2014.

The Hon'ble Supreme Court issued directions during the hearing held on 07-03-2014 that the state government and the state election commission shall take steps to issue notification for conduct of ordinary elections to ZPPs and MPPs by 10-03-2014 and submit a compliance report to the Hon'ble court by the next hearing scheduled on 10-03-2014.³

The state election commission immediately issued notification No. 166/SEC-B2/2014-1 on 07-03-2014 for publication of photo electoral rolls of gram Panchayats, Manadal Praja Parishads and Zilla Praja Parishads with reference to 1-1-2012 as qualifying dated on 10-03-2014 duly adopting the latest Assembly electoral rolls published with reference to the said date along with supplements ordered under continuous updating up to date as per the existing laws for the purpose of conduct of 4th ordinary elections to ZPPs and MPPs facilitating newly enrolled voters to exercise their franchise in the said elections.

The statement government finalized and communicated reservation information of seats and offices in Zilla Praja Parishads and Mandal Praja Parishads to the commission on 08-03-2014 evincing vide Lr.NO. 2718/Elecs/2014-1 dated 08-03-2014.

The commission issued election notification on 10-03-2014 for conduct of 4th ordinary elections to Zilla Praja Parishads and Mandal Praja Parishads in the state on 6-04-2014 and counting and declaration of results on 08-04-2014.

After issue of election notification several political parties have represented and requested the commission in a political party meeting to reschedule the elections in view of close proximity of schedules of local body elections and elections to APLA and HOP.⁴ The Collectors and district election authorities and superintendents of police/commissioners of police urged the commission to conduct MPTC/ZPTC elections in two phases in order to overcome shortage of polling personnel and also for making adequate band bust arrangements with the available force in two meetings held with senior police officials, they concurred with the view that elections are to be held in at least two phases so as to facilitate movement of forces between two phases of poll in order to conduct elections in a free, fair and peace full manner.

Based on these inputs, the commission filed an affidavit before the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India requesting to allow the commission to reschedule the MPTC/ZPTC elections to conduct polls in two phases on 06-04-2014 and 08-04-2014 and to conduct counting of votes on 11-04-

2014 keeping in view the schedules announced for elections to APLA and HOP and also the SSC public examinations scheduled from 27-03-2014 to 15-04-2014.

The Hon'ble Supreme Court of India on 25-03-2014 asked the commission to consider another date for the second phase of poll instead of 08-04-2014 as it is falling on Sriramanavami festival and the petitioners in the case objected for holding poll on Sriramanavami festival day.

The commission submitted a revised schedule as under to the Hon'ble court for consideration

First Phase of poll 06-04-2014

Second phase of poll 11-04-2014⁵

These are applications filed by the government of Andhra Pradesh seeking rescheduling the election programme for the Panchayat and other local bodies which was notified for 10th March, 2014 and is now requested to be rescheduled to 6th April, 2014 and 11th April 2014. The request is not opposed by any of the parties except the fact that the results of the election be declared after 7th May, 2014 as it has been pointed out that 30th April, 2014 and 7th May, 2014 are the polling dates for general election in the state due to which the results of the Panchayat polls and local bodies should be declared after 7th May, 2014.

To see no reason to decline this request s to accept the contention that the election of the Panchayat and other local bodies which could not be held on the notified date may now be rescheduled and now be held on 6th April, 2014 and 11th April, 2-14 as requested. Necessary notification be made in this regard.

In the said order, the Hon'ble court has clearly allowed the commission to reschedule the date of poll to be held in two phases on 06-04-21014 and 11-04-2014. Accordingly, the commission rescheduled the election programme and fixed the date of poll as 06-04-2014 and 11-04-2014.

The counting of votes of MPTCs and ZPTCs was also rescheduled to a date after completion of the last phase of poll on 07-05-2014 in connection with general elections to APLA/HOP as per the directions of

the Hon'ble Supreme Court. The counting of votes of MPTCs/ZPTCs was conducted on 13-05-2014. The ballot boxes containing polled MPTC and ZPTC ballot papers were preserved till the date of counting (for more than a month) under proper watch and ward as per the instructions given by the commission.

After completion of counting of votes in respect of all MPTCs/ZPTCs (except 6 MPTCs in Martur MPP covered by stay order of Hon'ble High Court an undertaking counting process).⁶ The results were declared. The commission also notified the date of first meeting of MPPs for the purpose of commencement of term of elected members as 04-07-2014 and that of ZPPs as 05-07-2014. There were some disturbances in some ZPPs particularly SPSR Nellore, Prakasam and Ranga Reddy and also in a few MPPs at the time of conduct of indirect elections due to keen contest and the commission has taken adequate measures to ensure free and fair elections in those difficult local bodies.

Electoral Rolls

As per the provisions of Section 11 of APPR Act 1994 and rules relating to preparation and publication of electoral rolls issued in G.O. Ms.No. 254 PR & RD (Elecs.) Department dated 4-8-2000, the latest assembly electoral rolls shall be adopted in toto for preparation of Panchayat electoral rolls. The entries in the latest assembly electoral rolls shall be correctly reflected in the Panchayat electoral rolls. Any inclusions or deletions ordered under Section 22 or 23 as a case may of the representation of the people Act, 1950, by the ERO concerned in assembly electoral rolls upto the date of the election notification shall be carried out in the electoral roll of gram Panchayat.

The commission decided to use photo electoral rolls for conduct of elections to MPTCs and ZPTCs emulating practice that is followed during elections to state legislative assembly and the house of people in Andhra Pradesh by the election commission of India.

The Hon'ble High Court issued directions to the commission to issue election notification for MPTCs and ZPTCs at very short notice on 07-03-2014, the Hon'ble Supreme Court directed the commission to issue

election notification by 10-03-2014. The commission issued a notification on the same day i.e., on 07-03-2014 for preparation and publication of Gram Panchayat. MPP and ZPP electoral rolls on 10-03-2014 with reference to 1-1-2014 as qualifying date duly adopting finally published and updated assembly photo electoral rolls. The publication took place on 10-03-2014. This exercise of preparation and publication of electoral rolls was done in a record time of four days to comply with the directions of the Supreme Court to issue election notification 10-03-2014 and at the same time providing for adoption of latest assembly electoral rolls which form the mother-rolls for Panchayat Raj elections.

Reservations

The Hon'ble Supreme Court directed the statement and the commission to take steps to issue election notification for MPTCs and ZPTCs by 10-03-2014. In pursuance of these directions, the government finalized and notified reservation of seats and offices in MPPs and ZPPs on a war-footing and communicated the reservation information to the commission on 08-03-02014 evening. The details of Chairperson, Zilla Praja Parishad is shown in table 6.1.

Administrative Machinery

The commission appointed the administrative machinery for conduct of elections to Panchayat Raj Institutions in the state.⁷

1. The Commissioner of Panchayat Raj was appointed as the election authority.
2. The district Collectors were appointed as district election authorities. The functions of the election authority under conduct of election rules may also be performed, unless specifically otherwise provided by the district election authority with in his jurisdiction subject to the general superintendence, direction and control of the state election Commissioner. The district election authority shall be responsible for the conduct, co-ordination and supervision of all items of work connected with the conduct of election of member of the Mandal Praja Parishad and the member of the Zilla Praja Parishad with in his jurisdiction.
3. The Joint Collector of the district and chief executive officer of Zilla Praja Parishad has been appointed as additional district election authorities. The revenue divisional officers or sub-collectors in the district were appointed as deputy district election authorities. The additional district election authorities and deputy district election authorities shall perform such functions as may be assigned to them by the district election authority.
4. the district election authorities were authorized to appoint MROs, MPDOs or any other gazetted officer as assistant district election authority to perform any function assigned to them by the district election authority in connection with the conduct of elections to Panchayat Raj bodies as for the provisions of APPR (conduct of elections), Rules, 2006.
5. The district election authorities were authorized to appoint returning officers and assistant returning officers in connection with conduct of elections to Zilla Praja Parishads, Mandal Praja Parishads.

6. Every assistant returning officer shall subject to the control of the returning officer is competent to perform all or any functions of the returning officer except those relating to scrutiny of nominations.
7. The district election authority or any officer authorized by him was empowered to appoint a presiding officer for each polling station and such other polling personnel as deemed necessary.

Returning Officers and Assistant Returning Officers

For every election to fill the offices of members of mandal Parishad or members of Zilla Praja Parishad, the district election authority shall designate as returning officer who shall as far as possible be a gazetted officer of the state government or of local authority not below the rank of Mandal Parishad Development Officer.

Zilla Parishad

In majority of the districts, the district election authorities appointed the Chief Executive Officers of Zilla Parishads as returning officers for conduct of elections to members of Zilla Praja Parishad in some districts.

The nominations for all the ZPTCs in the district were received in the respective Zilla Praja Parishads only. If there is a rush of too many candidates, the commission issued instructions for opening more number of centres in the office of the Zilla Praja Parishad for receiving nominations and that these centres can managed by the assistant returning officers who receive the nomination papers and hand over them to the returning officers with such briefing as they deem fit. Besides them, all Mandal Parishad Development Officers were appointed as assistant returning officers for elections to the respective ZPTCs.

Financial Arrangements

The 4th ordinary elections to MPTCs and ZPTCs were notified on 10-03-2014 complying with the directions given by the Supreme Court of India. The government issued various orders releasing the budget required for conduct of elections to the commission, to the district to the commissioner of printing and stationery and to the police department.

The government also fixed rates of remuneration payable to the personnel drafted on election duty.

District Election Budget

The commissioner of Panchayat Raj and rural employment, who is entrusted with the responsibility of projecting the budget requirement for conduct of elections for each district and submit proposals to government, estimated the total budget requirement for conduct of elections to all the 22 districts as Rs.141,58,52,255 in addition to this a proposal was also made for providing Rs.13,77,47,319 for preparation, publication and printing of electoral rolls for conduct of elections to PRIs.⁸

Commission's Election Budget

The annual budget released to the commission consists of only expenditure required to run the office. Therefore, whenever ordinary elections are held on a proposal sent by the Commission, the government provides additional funds to meet election related expenditure in the Commission.

The government released Rs.85,00,000 to the commission as additional funds to meet election related expenditure of elections to Panchayat Raj bodies (both gram Panchayat elections and MPP/ZPP elections)⁹ The commission incurred an expenditure of Rs.44,33,095 during gram Panchayat elections held in July 2013 leaving a balance of Rs.40,66,905 for MPP/ZPP elections the expenditure incurred for gram Panchayat elections includes honorarium equal to one month salary as on 01-07-2013 payable to the officers and staff members working in the commission during the election period.¹⁰ The Secretary of the Commission was permitted to draw the entire balance amount of Rs.40,66,905 on AC bill for smooth conduct of elections and to incur expenditure beyond 31-03-2014 without any financial constraints as election process went beyond 31-03-2014 as poll was held in two phases on 06-04-2014 and 11-04-2014.¹¹

The commission incurred an expenditure of Rs.17,63,563 in connection with conduct of MPP/ZPP elections and remitted the balance amount to the government account. The expenditure incurred for

MPP/ZPP elections includes honorarium equal to 15 days salary as on 1-4-2014 payable to the officers and staff members working in the commission during the election period.¹²

Police Budget

The Director General of Police has sent a proposal to the government to provide additional funds to the tune of Rs.2703.02 lakhs for making bandobust arrangements for 2014 elections.

The government released Rs.20,27,26.000 for bandobust in connection with elections vide G.O. Rt.No. 422 Hone (Police budget) dated 03-04-2014 in a separate sanction issued in G.O.Rt.No. 584, Home (Policy Budget) Dept. dated 13-05-2014 government released Rs.3,86,62,000 for making arrangements in connection with conduct of ZPTC/MPTC elections and also municipal elections which were held simultaneously as per the directions of the High Court.

Commissioner of Printing and Stationary

The government released funds required for procurement of indelible ink and white wove and pink wove paper and also for printing of forms. Covers and booklets in connection with conduct of elections to gram Panchayats, MPP and ZPPs in the G.Os mentioned in table 6.5

Election Programme

The state government and the commission shall take steps to issue notification for conduct of ordinary elections to ZPPs and MPPs by 10-03-2014.¹⁴ The poll was scheduled on 06-04-2014 and counting of votes on 08-04-2014. Subsequently, the date of poll in the 2nd phase was re-fixed as 11-04-2014 and counting of votes was rescheduled to 13-05-2014 complying with the directions of the Supreme Court of India.

In the political parties meeting held on 13-03-2014 several political parties have represented and requested the commission to reschedule the elections in view of close proximity of schedules of local body elections and elections to APLA and HOP. The commission also gathered inputs from district collectors; SPs/CPs at the district level and senior police officials at state level on phasing of poll and the majority opinion was in favour of 2nd phase poll from the stand point of administrative and bandobust arrangement for smooth conduct of election process.

Based on these inputs the commission filed an affidavit before the Supreme Court of India requesting to allow the commission to reschedule

the MPTC/ZPTC elections to conduct polls in two phases on 06-04-2014 and 08-04-2014 and to conduct counting of votes on 11-04-2014 keeping in view the schedules announced for elections to APLA and HOP and also the SSC Public Examinations scheduled from 27-03-2014 to 15-04-2014. The Supreme Court on 25-03-2014 asked the commission to consider another date for the second phase of poll instead of 08-04-2014 as it falling on Sriramanavami festival and the petitioners in the case objected for holding poll on Sriramanavami festival day.

The commission submitted revised schedule as under to the Supreme Court for consideration.

First phase of poll 06-04-2014

Second phase of poll 11-04-2014

Counting of votes on 13-04-2014

The Supreme Court made the following order on 27-03-2014.

These are applications filed by the government of Andhra Pradesh seeking rescheduling of the election programme for the Panchayat and other local bodies which was notified for 10th March, 2014 and is now requested to be rescheduled to 6th April 2014 and 11th April 2014. The request is not opposed by any of the parties except the fact that the 30th April 2014 and 7th May, 2014 are the polling dates for general election in the state due to which the results of the Panchayat polls and local bodies should be declared after 7th May 2014.

Political Parties and Election Symbols

The Commission issued symbol notification specifying the list of recognized national and state parties recognized state parties in other states and symbols reserved for them registered political parties with reserved symbols, registered political parties without reserved symbol and also the list of free symbols to be allotted to the independent candidates in ZPTC elections.¹⁵

As per the procedure stipulated by the commission, the candidate set up by recognized political parties and registered political parties have to submit Form-A/Form-B within the stipulated time to the designated authorities in support of their claim that they were set up by the political

party concerned. The deadline for submission of Form-A to the Collector and district election authority concerned was fixed at 5.00 PM on the last day for making nominations. The dead line for submission of Form-B to the returning officer concerned was fixed at 3.00 PM on the last date of withdrawal of candidature.

Symbols reserved for recognized political parties and registered political parties (with a reserved symbol) were allotted to the candidates set up by those parties who submitted Form-A/Form-B within the stipulated time.

The candidate set up by registered political parties without reserved symbol and independent candidates were asked to give their choice of three free symbols in the order of preference and returning officer allotted free symbols to such candidates following the procedure prescribed by the commission.

During the 2014 elections of Kadapa Zilla Parishad comprises 50 ZPTCs (see Table 6.7) and 559 MPTCs for which completion of elections 1768 polling stations were formed 1945 Presiding Officers were appointed. Five number of Returning Officers as well as 10 Assistant Returning Officers for ZPTC in addition.
